
2022 ANNUAL REPORT 2023









Launched in September 2015, Qarjuit Youth Council (QYC) is an ethnic, non-for-profit organization representing dynamic and dedicated Inuit youth of Nunavik and Chisasibi between the ages of 15 to 35. We exist to provide our youth with opportunities and knowledge in order to improve their quality of life, to empower themselves and to explore their full potential as responsible citizens and leaders. Exposure and involvement for all youth at the grass-roots to local, regional and international levels is one of our main goals. Giving youth the voice they deserve, in the modern society we currently live in and, to also bring forward our cultural values is the core of our functions.

We aim for Nunavik youth to be empowered and have the space, support and resources from all partners in Nunavik and beyond to express their needs, their issues and their wishes. Youth are in a position to mobilize themselves through their cultural resiliency and knowledge in both environments: modern day society and their root identities.





OUR YOUTH INITIATIVES

MENTAL HEALTH CAMPAIGN SIVUMUARNIK- />J GOING FORWARD

DESCRIPTION

The goal of this campaign is to inform youth about mental wellness and to encourage them to take daily small actions to improve their health and help people around them. These wellness tasks help youth have a better understanding of different actions they can take to feel better physically and mentally. Promoting physical and mental health is really important. This challenge is linked to life celebration, in addition to mental well-being promotion.

OUTCOME

This Sivumuarnik campaign is daily tasks designed to help youth prioritize their mental wellness needs. It is a way to inform and destigmatize, as well as an opportunity to encourage Youth to take action for their well-being and build their self-confidence, while bringing on social media wave of positivity. The expected outcomes are to share information to youth about how to prioritize their mental health, giving simple examples of what they could potentially integrate in their daily routine. We encouraged youth making a short video or a text post to encourage others to join the challenge. Every action was posted on our #garjuityouthcouncil Facebook page as well as on our Tik Tok page.

DESCRIPTION

Uvikkait Ullumi is a newspaper that highlights youth achievements, initiatives and concerns in the region. 

ELDERS AND YOUTH RETREAT ON THE LAND -QUAQTAQ

DESCRIPTION

Last June, QYC brought youth and elders together on the land enhancing traditional activities and opening a dialogue between generations about our history, our culture, our traditions and creating a safe space for talking about solutions on how to move forward together towards a positive future. It's an opportunity to ask questions and propose solutions together, as well as creating relationships between generations.

OUTCOME

Youth are learning, throughout this project, about historical events, past lifestyles, cultural values and Inuit strength through the stories of our elders. There were traditional activities, discussions, stories, and more, as we wanted to help facilitate the discussions and the learning process through the event, by connecting with one another.

OUR YOUTH INITIATIVES

LOCAL YOUTH ACTIONS FUNDING (LYAF)

DESCRIPTION

A grant of \$150,000 was made available to the 14 communities of Nunavik and Chisasibi to financially support and encourage local projects and activities that transfer Inuit culture, build self-esteem, develop leadership skills, enhance everyday life and share information and educational opportunities. QYC is in charge of structuring the LYAF, assisting youth in the application process, distributing the funding and making sure each funded project is accountable.



DESCRIPTION OF ALL PROJECTS FUNDED

PRACTICE THROAT SINGING

PUVIRNITUQ

This project is meant to teach and practice throat singing with youth. Every week, after school, youth usually come for practicing throat singing with professional singers and animators. They even get to perform, as well as learning about their culture while keeping this wonderful Inuit traditional skill alive.



CULTURAL TRIP TO TORONTO

QUAQTAQ

The English and French teachers of Isummasaqvik want to give secondary 4 and 5 students the opportunity to work toward a trip to Toronto in the spring. Many of them have shown great interest in visiting Canada's biggest metropolis. This project is a way to keep students engaged in school until the end of the year. Collaborating with students on planning, organizing, and fundraising for this project will prove to be a highly motivating thread to carry through the year and to finish high school. They are responsible for raising a significant amount of fundraising toward their goal. The desired result of guiding their fundraising efforts is to develop and nourish organizational skills, responsibility, motivation, self-esteem, and belonging. Morale, energy, motivation, and hope are seemingly at an all-time low for many. We want to give them a big project to dream about, to take responsibility for, and ultimately, to realize together.

TRAINING CAMP COUNSELLORS

PUVIRNITUQ

This project aims to plan and organize a camp by training young camp counselors on how to run a successful summer camp. For two years now, there's a two-week training program before the camp starts, as well as another two-week during summer. This training gives them knowledge and guidance on best practices. This project benefits the youth participating to the camp, as well as the young counselors to have an amazing summer camp experience.

NUKARIIT 2.0

PUVIRNITUQ

Nukariit has been a successful ongoing project (funded by Qarjuit) since 2019. The mission is to offer teenage girls aged 12 to 18 a safe space where they can learn and develop social, cultural, and life skills, as well as creating a space where they can socialize, increase their self-esteem, and develop a sense of community. This project also aims to promote positive life habits and address different topics related to adolescence while having fun. Activities include self-care nights, yoga, cooking, therapeutic activities like mandalas, breathing techniques and emotional management activities. Some other activities include sexual education, storytelling, fishing, and more.

DOGSLEDDING TOUR

INUKJUAK

This project is meant to inspire and teach students about dogsledding, a precious Inuit tradition. Youth have the chance to go on dogsled tours on the land and learn directly from the dogsled owners.

This project is also a way to support and encourage the dogsled owners to keep this tradition alive.



^{* (}extension): these projects were successful projects from previous years who got extended for funding this fiscal year.

^{**} Please note that due to difficulties in recruiting staff, the majority of LYAF projects were started or funded later in the fiscal year, which explains the reduced funding number in the report. Several projects that applied during this fiscal year have been transferred to the following fiscal year, so that the financial agreements would be relevant and optimal for accounting purposes. On a positive note, we already have some great projects kicking off for 2023-2024, this is sure to be a landmark year for Local Youth Actions Funding.

OUR YOUTH INITIATIVES

EDUCATIONAL VIDEO -SERIES ON HEALTHY RELATIONSHIP

DESCRIPTION

The educational video project intends to choose specific topics or themes relevant to our youth and create video projects that aim to explain and inform in a stimulating and interactive way. We decided to create these videos in order to pass the information more easily to the youth of the region. Videos were mostly promoted on Youtube, Facebook and Tik Tok.

OUTCOME

QYC selected an important theme last year to work on healthy relationships, more specifically the meaning of consent and going into more details about sexual consent, answering questions asked by youth around this topic.

Our team worked hard on a series of 7 videos that was officially launched last January 2023. The goal is to offer more content related to sex education that can be used at school or by student counselors in the different communities we represent.

REGIONAL YOUTH NETWORKING TOUR

DESCRIPTION

Following a high demand for Qarjuit to travel to each of the communities to see first hand the realities, needs and particularities across the region, to create an efficient contact flow between the communities and the organization, and to build a regional network of youth, our organization is planning a yearly Regional Youth Networking Tour along the Board of Directors team. It's an opportunity for Qarjuit's members to discuss with the youth about opportunities, address many topics, and talk about available resources and upcoming projects.

OUTCOME

Members of the Board of Directors traveled around Nunavik, on their specific coastal area, to meet and discuss with the youth and share opportunities and information about QYC.

This year, only Hudson Bay Representatives, Lukasi Iyaituk and Linda Kowcharlie, within our Board of Directors completed their tour.

NUNAVIK TREATY SIMULATION ON THE JAMES BAY NORTHERN QUEBEC AGREEMENT (JBNQA)

DESCRIPTION

In collaboration with the Gordon Foundation (gordonfoundation.ca), on October 17 to 20th, we offered to Nunavik youth, as the future leaders of their communities, an opportunity to better understand what is the JBNQA and how it impacts their lives. We created a space for many great advisors to share their experience and knowledge with youth about this important treaty. It was also an occasion for youth to learn how to negotiate about two specific sections of the agreement (sections 17 and 15) on how to respectively propose a new vision for education in Nunavik, as well as on the mental health programming. Makivvik, Kativik Ilisarniliriniq and the Nunavik Regional Board on Health and Social Services were also part of the activity to transfer knowledge and support the participants. This first time event was greatly appreciated and led to another collaboration with Makivvik on the UNDRIP see next page (16).

OUTCOME

The simulation was meant to offer a safe space to youth to learn about the following:

- Teach about your rights and how everything connects back to the JBNQA
- Give a hands-on learning opportunity to build a new vision for some parts of the JBNQA (education and mental health)
- Transfer knowledge and skills from current leaders and elders
- Help build connections with an amazing group of youth and advisors.

REACH

PERIOD

FACE-TO-FACE MEETING

DESCRIPTION

Exclusively dedicated for all eleven Board members and the General Manager, the face-to-face meeting is an opportunity for the Board members and the General Manager to discuss the affairs of the council and take decisions. This two-day yearly meeting usually take place in one of the fifteen communities of Nunavik and Chisasibi.

OUTCOME

The last face-to-face meeting took place in Montreal after a 2-day of training with the INRS (Institut National de Recherche Scientifique) about youth leadership and engagement. The face-to-face meeting that was held on February 27 and 28th was a great opportunity for the Board members and the General Manager to discuss about the upcoming Yearly Action Plan for 2023-2024 and to approve the yearly budget.

OUR YOUTH INITIATIVES

POLITICAL REPRESENTATION -RENCONTRES ACTION **JEUNESSE [RAJ]**

DESCRIPTION

This political event allows Qarjuit to represent the Inuit youth and voice their needs and concerns through a political youth gathering of 3 days at the National Assembly, Quebec.

OUTCOME

QYC attended for the second time, this past year, a political event organized by Force Jeunesse (Rencontre Action Jeunesse) at the National Assembly in Quebec where we met with different political leaders, such as the Minister responsible for Indigenous Affairs, Ian Lafrenière, to discuss Inuit youth priorities and QYC needs in term of development. This unique occasion was also a great opportunity for QYC to meet with over 30 other youth organizations and enhance discussions about youth leadership and further opportunities of collaborations.

UNITED NATION DECLARATION ON THE RIGHTS OF **INDIGENOUS PEOPLES** [UNDRIP] WORKSHOP

DESCRIPTION

This past March 2023, with the collaboration of Makivvik, Exeko and many great advisors, we brought our community leaders together to reflect on their rights and the different articles under the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP), opening the floor to discussion on where our governments should reinforce the focus for improvement.

OUTCOME

A session of 4 days was offered to our QYC leaders to learn and exchange about the UNDRIP. The youth leaders were invited to summarize their thoughts and ideas around the upcoming national Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act Action Plan, giving recommendations and priorities for the health, education, environment and Inuit practices sectors. PERIOD

DESCRIPTION

This challenge is a self-esteem campaign that aims to help youth self-identify accomplishments for themselves and others. It is meant to demonstrate that even the smallest gesture and accomplishment counts when it makes you proud!

OUTCOME

During a 3-week period, we shared accomplishments of youth from the region and posted positive and motivational messages on social media about bigger or smaller accomplishments that make people proud. Also, people were invited to go on our website and fill out a short and easy form highlighting their accomplishment OR a youth they know. Every participant received a little gift (recycled wooden keychain) with a personalized letter of congratulations. This time again, to increase the number of participants we can reach out and have a larger impact, we promoted the BE THE SPARK on our Tik Tok social media page. We also increased the number of participants in Kuujjuaq, by collaborating with the high school students from Jaanimmarik in their art class. Our QYC President was presenting what makes her proud in her life to encourage the students sharing after their own spark and/or the spark of someone they know. The campaign was a great success again this year.

PERIOD

Again this year, all James Bay Northern Quebec Agreement (JBNQA) beneficiaries aged 15 to 35 years old were called on to vote. The Executive Secretary Treasurer position and the Ungava Board of Directors positions were up for election (two seats). Janice Parsons, from Kuujjuaq, and Anita Annanack, from Kangirsualujjuaq, were then elected to represent the Ungava side, as Board of Director for Qarjuit and William Ningiuruvik, from Quaqtaq, was acclaimed in the Secretary Treasurer position. As Sevim Ilgun resigned from the President position and QYC couldn't go again into a second election process that same year, our Board of Directors unanimously acclaimed Janice

Parsons (previously Ungava Representative), as President since October 31st for the remaining mandate of 3 years. Elena Mesher, which was the third most voted candidate for the Ungava seat, was then acclaimed into the vacant Ungava seat. Elena Mesher, now being on maternity leave, was replaced by Lucina Gordon for a one-year mandat.

Our organization is very pleased with its new dynamic leadership team and we are hopeful and excited for the future of our organization!

OUR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - IVUJIVIK

of Ivujivik. For this incredible event,
QYC brought 2 youth from each of the
14 communities of Nunavik and Chisasibi
(total of 30 youth) to the most northern
village on Hudson Strait, Ivujivik. The QYC
team, Executives along with Board of Directors
were all really proud of this achievement.

QYC is mandated to organize a general assembly every year to present and discuss the Annual Report and financial statements. In other words, it is a time to sit all together with youth and to be totally transparent about what is going on in the organization and looking forward to what we collectively want to accomplish in the future, while connecting, listening and learning from each other's experiences throughout a diverse range of workshops, activities and presentations.

Here is a glimpse of what Elisapie Lamoureux, Hudson Strait Representative for QYC shared after hosting this major event in her hometown:

"I am grateful that Ivujivik, my little community that doesn't get many opportunities to host large meetings, finally had the chance to receive youth from all over our beautiful land of Nunavik. I am proud of my team for the hard work they have done to make it a success because it's not easy to plan big events, especially in small communities. Qarjuit Youth Council made it happen and it is certainly an event that I will never forget and always carry in my heart (all the events we do are dear to me, but I think you can understand that it was special for me to welcome QYC to my community instead of travelling to another)."

Thank you Elisapie for the beautiful welcoming in Ivujivik and for all your great work making it a reality. It wouldn't have been possible without your support and dedication to QYC.

Again, this year, and following a previous collaboration at the Annual General Meeting of 2021 in Chisasibi, we were all very pleased to welcome three representatives of the Cree Nation Youth Council (CNYC) in Ivujivik, Adrian Gunner, Youth Grand Chief from Mistissini, Jordan Masty, Deputy Youth Grand Chief, from Whapmagoostui, and Tania Richmond, Projects Coordinator from Val d'Or. These CNYC delegates travelled all the way from Eeyou Istchee to Ivujivik to attend our annual assembly. This invitation was meant for giving us more chance to learn and collaborate all together to unify work and impacts toward youth. It was a great occasion for the Cree youth to meet Inuit youth while leaning from different cultural background practices.

On behalf of all youth representatives, board members, executive and staff, an immense NAKURMIIK to Ivujimmiut and all partners for writing with us this important page of our history and for making this event a reality with all your help and support.

See you next year in Kangirsuk on the Ungava Coast this time, for our 2023 Annual General Meeting and until then keep up being involved with us!

OUR TEAM TRAININGS AND EMPLOYEES RECOGNITION

YOUTH ENGAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP WORKSHOP

In collaboration with the Institut National de recherche scientifique (INRS)

DESCRIPTION

This workshop, in collaboration with Magalie Quintal and Lydia Risi from the INRS, provided a 2-day session of discussion and application of youth engagement and leadership. The 2-day training was developed along a creative methodology, with art and beading workshops reinforcing the strengths and positive vision of each and everyone within the team. This time was given to our community leaders to reflect on their leadership skills, on their different mandates and responsibilities, identifying what is already existing, as resources and abilities, and what they would like to improve. The discussion ended on how they could take action on their ideas, and how this could bring them further for the betterment of their community and for the betterment of QYC.
